



The event has without doubt had a profound impact on the morale and unity of our communities. Hosting the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships in our region will have far reaching implications, ranging from economic growth and infrastructure development to cultural exchange,

National Mountain Bike Innovation Centre



National Mountain Bike Innovation Centre secures planning permission. £19million investment to preserve and reuse historic mill building and create a state-of-the-art R&D facility to support the continued growth and innovation opportunities of the Mountain Biking Industry.

Eddleston village



Eddleston village is now fully connected to Peebles via a brand-new 6km multi-user path which runs through stunning rolling fields and alongside the Eddleston Water. Over £2 million has been invested by Sustrans, Scottish Borders Council and South of Scotland Enterprise to create the 6kms of dedicated active travel path and a new bridge.



Dalbeattie Rocks and Wheels



Dalbeattie Rocks and Wheels successfully secured £6m from the UK Levelling Up Fund to progress a landmark regeneration project to re-purpose the old schoolhouse to a new bunkhouse, pump track and climbing wall.

Active Travel Path



Breaking Ground for Keir, Penpont & Thornhill Development Trust will deliver a brand new 2.6km active travel path, connecting Penpont and Thornhill. The active travel path link will realise a 5-year ambition and a £2.3million investment in safer ways to travel.



D&G Active Travel Strategy



In 2023 Dumfries & Galloway Council rolled out the 2022-2032 Active Travel Strategy. The strategy will promote more collaboration across Council services and improve planning, design, and delivery of active travel infrastructure.

Scottish Downhill Association Events



The SDA is a non-profit organisation associated to Scottish and British Cycling. They have successfully promoted the Scottish Downhill Series and Scottish Championships together with the northern rounds of the HSBC British Downhill National Series. They attracted over 400 participants to race weekends held at Ae & Innerleithen in 2023.



Bikeability Scotland




The Bikeability Scotland Awards recognise outstanding achievement in the delivery of Bikeability Scotland, the national cycle training programme for school children, managed by Cycling Scotland.

Scottish Borders Council in the summer of 2023 asked communities and members of the public to tell them where new shared access routes should be developed in the Scottish Borders and which routes should be given priority.



A CULTURE OF DELIVERY TO ACHIEVE OUR VISION

The Strategy and Priority Action plan were created to specifically support the VISION.

The strategy has a 10-year timeframe and covers all aspects of cycling in Dumfries and Galloway and the Scottish Borders, which sit under six themes:

- Infrastructure
- · Sport, recreation and wellbeing
- Sustainable economy and communities
- Innovation and technology
- Destination development and promotion
- Events

The Priority Action Plan has three distinct timeframes, with immediate opportunities presented by the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships, which has successfully attracted over a million spectators to the events staged across Scotland and more than one billion viewers worldwide, making it one of the top 10 global sporting events.

Medium term, the strategy aims to see improvements in cycling infrastructure and successful implementation of a range of projects.

Over the long term, the partnership will look to deliver on the region's Net Zero commitments and make cycling an inclusive and accessible transport option for everyone living, working and visiting the region.

The strategy will also aim to help strengthen the offering for visitors to the South of Scotland, with cycling presenting a significant opportunity to build on the natural capital of the region.

A GLOBAL EVENT BORN IN SCOTLAND


From 3 to 13 August 2023, the inaugural UCI Cycling World Championships was hosted in Glasgow and across our region with the Para-Cycling World Championships taking place in Dumfries and Tweed Valley (Scottish Borders) becoming the global stage for Cross Country and Cross Country Marathon. It was the single biggest cycling event in history, bringing together for the first time 13 existing UCI World Championships into one mega event. Importantly it was the first mega event staged in Scotland since the pandemic and was a policy driven event that aspired to drive behavioural change across Scotland.

The global TV audience placed the event in the top-10 most watched sporting events in the world, rivalling the Olympics and Commonwealth Games and placing South of Scotland on the world stage as a destination for elite cycling and cycle tourism.

Everyone deserves the opportunity to experience the freedom riding a bike can bring to their lives. South of Scotland Cycling Partnership worked with laser focus on a detailed optimisation plan to ensure our investments, our efforts and our projects amplified and unified existing work and activity across health, transport, tourism and participation.

It was an honour for Dumfries to play host to the first Paracycling World Championships in the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships. This landmark first joint championships has shone a spotlight on the sport and could change the scheduling to full integration forever and provided our region with the opportunity to underpin our committment

across the South of Scotland to Equality, Diversity and Social Inclusion. Paracycling competitors added a crucially important dimension to UCI's 'Super Worlds'. The combined worlds has played a pivotal role in moving the bar and awareness with spectators who have never have had exposure to the kind of sacrifice, grit determination and challenges these athletes face to pursue their ambitions to become rainbow jersey champions.





A GLOBAL EVENT BORN IN SCOTLAND





The 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships embedded an ambitious Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) strategy where everybody could be part of this exciting and ground-breaking cycling event and South of Scotland Cycling Partnership played an important role in achieving this outcome across the two host destinations.

The objective was to host a world class event driven with a purpose to make this an event for everyone and to reach out to new audiences, inspiring more people to cycle using the 'power of the bike' as the catalyst for change. In delivering these priority areas, Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) was seen as integral to implementing this approach which would underpin all its policy-led initiatives.

Working in collaboration with Euan's Guide, the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships produced Planning for Inclusion Guidelines for each of the event delivery partners to work through as part of the build planning. Community mapping was included in these guidelines to help event delivery partners identify local community groups to work with and help reach news audiences, one of these being the deaf cycling community at Glentress Forest - a first in cycling. Feedback from both disabled and able bodied spectators attending the event has shown their experience to have been a positive one: 97%of people who attended the event felt it was inclusive, 93% of spectators with a disability found the event to be accessible.

We actively encourage through strategic investments the creation of events which are varied in scale and make a range of impacts but ultimately increase participation opportunities for our visitors and our communities.

Every cycling event held in our region is equal in importance because without a a balanced approach to race design, participation and style our visitors and citizens wouldn't have a range of riding experiences and progressions that they can enjoy.

Our region is a rich tapestry of events which move us ever closer towards lifting our crown as Scotland's leading cycling destination.

2023 was an incredible opportunity for partners across the South of Scotland to seize this once in a lifetime opportunity to place our region's narrative on maximising the opportunities of being the host destination.

Partners used it as a launch pad to remind consumers of the joy of riding a bike to discover the hidden gems within a region during their holiday or as dedicated experience to tour our beautiful towns, villages and hamlets.

South of Scotland Destination Alliance – Support for the Priority Action Plan



SSDA Conference March 2023 was to be the largest attended regional tourism conference in Scotland in that year.

In March 2023 South of Scotland Destination Alliance officially launched Scotland's newest and longest on road cycling touring route and unveiled the name as Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast.

Since then South of Scotland Destination Alliance have embedded Cycling Promotional activity across their online and offline campaign platforms and strategies with outstanding results.

Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast Soft Launch

Created a soft launch campaign strategy which included VIP hosting for dedicated cycling industry magazines and associated press trips with The Guardian, Cycling Weekly, Much Better Adventures, Daily Record. In total **56 pieces of coverage were secured** in that first 10 days of the launch of the name with a **reach of 1.77 billion estimated audience**. Further coverage is planned for 2024.

Landing Pages, New Itineraries & Digital Photography Assets

350 new photographs and 10 promotional videos were created as digital support tools for South of Scotland tourism businesses to use to promote their businesses and the region as Scotland's Leading Cycling Destination.

The digital assets included UCI Cycling World Championships posters, graphics, suggested social media copy and Kirkpatrick C2C video and photography assets along with specific social media posts to celebrate the launch of the name of the route and the history behind the inventor of the world's first pedal bike which was created in the South of Scotland.

New Products Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast

An exciting new 250 mile on-road cycle route covering the length of the South of Scotland was digitally launched in 2023. The Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast will run from Stranraer to Eyemouth, making it one of the longest in the UK and a new challenge for experienced cyclists.


Walking and cycling routes can deliver significant economic, environmental and community benefits, and early projections are that the new South of Scotland Coast to Coast route could attract up to 175,000 new visitors to the region, with a direct spend of £13.7million per year.

The project was delivered in time for the 2023 UCI World Championships which took place in August 2023 in Dumfries & Tweed Valley, Scottish Borders.



The Kirkpatrick Coast to Coast Cycling Route sits on the <u>Sustrans-VisitScotland cycling routes map</u> and is included in VisitScotland's cycling landing page, which generates around 200K page views annually.

The map generated over 250K page views in 2022 and over 210K in 2023.



Owned Channel Support

VisitScotland worked with Tweed Valley mountain bike guide, Aneela McKenna, to create a 2:50 min video promoting mountain biking in the Tweed Valley. The video was promoted via VisitScotland paid social media activity in March 2023, which delivered 413K video views.

Cycling in the south of Scotland also featured in our email marketing and organic social media activity in 2023.





VisitScotland - Scotland is Calling

VisitScotland's current Scotland is Calling Expedia activity features mountain biking imagery from Glentress, and the Borders. An image of mountain biking in Glentress was also used to promote Adventure and Escapism in UK Expedia activity that's live from Sept 2023 – January 2024.

With cycling a priority sector across VisitScotland's marketing activity and with the positioning of Scotland: Made for Cycling. content will be weaved through their content calendar for 2024

In recent partnership marketing activity with South of Scotland Destination Alliance and DFDS ferries, cycling in Glentress and Galloway Forest Park are featured.

VisitScotland - Global PR

For Global PR VisitScotland secured coverage for Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast in a long length Guardian feature. The Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast feature in The Guardian. Working with DMBinS we had a 12-page mountain biking feature in German magazine BIKE that included Glentress in the Borders readership 385k. The Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast also featured in a New Zealand Herald article on cycling in Scotland and in a Telegraph article published in summer 2023. Cycling in Dumfries & Galloway also featured in a Cycling in Scotland article published by Reisen Exclusiv.

Community and Tourism Business support

VisitScotland has provided contributors a series of tourism business webinars led by SSDA with a focus on the opportunities for tourism businesses related to cycling tourism and the UCI Cycling World Championships. In addition, VisitScotland provided marketing support and advice in the run up to and for the soft launch of the KC2C.

VisitScotland provided support and advice to KPT Development Trust in the development of local routes.

VisitScotland iCentre support

Dumfries iCentre staff developed a report of local accessible accommodation, visitor attractions, restaurants and other facilities to support the additional needs of participants in the UCI Paracycling World Road Championships in Dumfries.





Strava Club

South of Scotland Destination Alliance have also become the first Destination Marketing & Management Organsiations in Scotland to harness the power and reach of Strava to create a Strave Group dedicated to riders planning trips & completing segments of the Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast. The aim of this is to use affiliate consumer recommendations to put the Kirkpatrick C2C on the map. The group has a leaderboard and encourages the sharing of riders images, comments and feedback. Within six months of launching the group has reached 120 members and growing.

Endura - A Forgotten Legend


Scottish brand Endura embarked on a journey to revive a forgotten legend of cycling history, recreating the groundbreaking pedal cycle invented by little-known Scottish icon Kirkpatrick Macmillan in 1839. An authentic recreation of the bike retraced Macmillan's historic journey from Thornhill, Dumfriesshire, to Glasgow.

Southern Upland Way Cycle Route

The Southern Upland Way Cycle Route makes road cycling the width of the country possible while taking in much of the same landscape and character as the famous Southern Upland Way using quiet back roads.











Scottish Borders Active Travel Strategy - Region-wide Consultation

In July 2023 Scottish Borders Council launched a region wide consultation to ask community groups and individuals to feedback on new walking and cycling route proposals for the Scottish Borders.

The consultation was launched to coincide with the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships.

Scottish Borders Council has worked with partners and local communities to develop various shared paths across the region and want to continue to build this network to help support more active travel by residents and visitors.

Eddleston Water Multi-Use Active Travel Path

The latest addition to the Scottish Borders local shared path network is the Eddleston Water multi-use path, which was officially opened in June following the work of the local community, landowners, Scottish Borders Council and funding from the Scottish Government via Sustrans Places for Everyone and South of Scotland Enterprise.

The Union Chain Bridge

The restoration of one of the world's oldest and most important bridges was completed in July 2023. The union chain bridge, which connects Scotland and England over the River Tweed between Northumberland and Berwickshire, was designed by navy captain Samuel Brown and opened in the 1820s. It was a trailblazer for the Brooklyn Bridge in New York as well as the world's longest bridge in Japan, and is now recognised as an international significant engineering landmark, sitting proudly alongside the Eiffel Tower, Sydney Harbour Bridge and the Panama Canal.

This ambitious project will forge stronger connections between border communities through the conservation and celebration of the Union Chain Bridge. It has reinstated the bridge to its former glory and provide exciting opportunities for people to explore its heritage, stories and setting.

The £10.5m overhaul saw every piece of the structure removed, checked and then restored and replaced before being reassembled.

The <u>Friends of the Bridge Group</u> worked tirelessly to raise funds and campaign for the restoration of the bridge which holds historical significance all over the world restoration will allow visitors to drive, cycle or walk over the famous bridge once again.





Hawick Flood Protection Scheme

The Hawick Active Travel Network project aims to introduce new and better spaces for walking, cycling, and wheeling around the town and was included as part of the Hawick Flood Protection Scheme following the devastating floods experienced by the residents of the town.

The design of the Active Travel Network will make journeys easier, safer, and healthier and involves widened paths, new widened footbridges, ramps and dedicated passageways around bridges, all intended to keep users as much as possible separate from traffic on the main streets.

Completed as part of the Flood Protection Scheme, this network will represent a major enhancement to the facilities and infrastructure of Hawick. It is providing significant potential to reduce car use and increase active travel – on foot or bicycle - as an everyday mode of transport, delivering benefits to health, air quality and quality of life to local residents and visitors. And it will do so in a totally safe environment. The network will be accessible to all, linking many areas of the town from Weensland all the way along to Volunteer Park.



Multi-Use Trail Path

4 kilometres of shared space trail

- · Based upon Paths For All Outdoor Accessibility Guidance
- Inclusive design approach, which is Disability Discrimination Act compliant.
- · Open landscape views with good sightlines.
- Connecting car parks, orientation and visitor destination facilities with the wider forest.

- Supporting visitation from a wider group of users will assist in activating associated mental health benefits, estimated in value at £26 million for Scotland (based on population size, at 2020 prices (Forest Research, 2021).



Forestry & Land Scotland Investments

The aim of the Glentress Masterplan is to deliver a future for the forest as a well-integrated, multi-user destination, which specialises in mountain biking and offers a world class visitor experience. It is creating new recreation opportunities and holiday accommodation through a strategic partnership investment with Forest Holidays, which will bring 20,000 new visitors a year to the Tweed Valley benefiting the local community, delighting our international visitors, improving trading conditions for local businesses, and supporting regional tourism.

The investment has delivered 16km of new mountain bike trails and will include an easily accessible skills area (due for completion in spring 2024), network and taster trails, and expanded capacity car parking for busier days.

In 2023 Forestry & Land Scotland completed in the South of Scotland 7stanes trail network to upgrade and replace trails with £50,000 being invested at Kirroughtree, Galloway, Dumfries & Galloway and £70,000 at Newcastleton, Scottish Borders.



Walkerburn Pump Track

2023 saw plans for a new pump track in Walkerburn move forward after funding was officially confirmed for the project.

The money has come from the Cycling Facilities Fund, an £8m Scottish Government fund managed by Scottish Cycling, DMBinS, and sportscotland, and Scottish Borders Council (SBC) and construction will begin in April 2024.

The new pump track will cater for a wide range of community and youth groups, not only for cycling but also for other wheel-based activities such as skating and skateboarding.

Dumfries & Galloway Active Travel Investments

The Council's second Active Travel Strategy (ATS2) was adopted by the Communities Committee on the 6th of October 2022 to provide a combined approach to active travel infrastructure and culture within Dumfries and Galloway, and better respond to sustainability challenges as part of the Council's Climate Emergency Declaration, carbon reduction targets and wider priorities.

Keir, Penpont & Thornhill

The project is being led by Keir, Penpont and Tynron Development Trust (KPTDT), backed by £1,557,806 of funding for design and construction from the Scottish Government, administered through Sustrans Scotland's Places for Everyone programme.

Benches and bike stands have also been installed at two placemaking areas along the path.

Match funding was secured from SWestrans, South of Scotland. Enterprise, Dumfries and Galloway Council Communities Committee, Scottish and Southern Electricity Renewables, and Annandale and Nithsdale Community Benefit Company (ANCBC).

Penpont Primary School attended a path safety session delivered by Transport, Planning and Engineering [TP&E], to celebrate a new active travel link in the Nithsdale area.

Phase 1A – the first in a multi-stage project – has created a traffic-free path which stretches from Penpont to the Drumlanrig access road, construction finished in December 2023. When phases 1B and 1C are complete, a 4km path will connect Penpont and Thornhill, enabling residents to safely walk, wheel and cycle between the two villages.

Dumfries Town

A brand new active travel network link launched in 2023 with improvements to the junctions at New Abbey Road, Pleasance Avenue and Park Road, which link the west of Dumfries to the town centre, have become a well-used route for Active Travel- making it easier and safer for everyone to walk, wheel and cycle in the area.

The Dumfries and Galloway Council-led project was made possible by over £800,000 of funding from the Scottish Government through Sustrans Scotland's Places for Everyone programme, with match funding from the Council, SWestrans and NHS Dumfries and Galloway.



South of Scotland

Cycling Infrastructure Fund



A new £350,000 South of Scotland Cycling Infrastructure Fund was launched in October 2023 to support the region's aim of becoming one of the leading cycling destinations in the world.

The Fund offers capital grants of £3,000 to £25,000 to support tourism businesses, social enterprises and community groups who own visitor facing assets to invest in cycling infrastructure.

The investments will improve facilities for visiting cyclists taking part in the Kirkpatrick C2C, South of Scotland's Coast to Coast cycling route, or riding the 7Stanes trail centres.

19 projects will go live in 2023 and a further 11 projects are in development for delivery in 2024 across the region adding significant value to the regional identity as a fantastic cycle holiday destination.

Mountain Bike Innovation Centre, Bike Park & Trail Lab.

2023 has seen a significant step forward for Scotland's Mountain Bike Innovation Centre with planning permission approval.

South of Scotland Enterprise (SOSE) has confirmed that planning permission has been secured to renovate Caerlee Mill in Innerleithen to be the home of the new Mountain Bike Innovation Centre.



Together with the proposed Tweed Valley Bike Park and Trail Lab near Innerleithen, the Mountain Bike Innovation Centre is a key development for Scotland and the wider UK Cycling Industry and will be funded as part of the Borderlands Inclusive Growth Deal.

The UK Government is investing £19million into the project. The Innovation Centre is predicted to contribute £141m in Gross Value Added (GVA) and create over 400 jobs in the South of Scotland over ten years. The overall project is being delivered by SOSE, alongside partners Edinburgh Napier University (ENU) and Scottish Borders Council (SBC).

The Innovation Centre will allow Scottish, UK and international companies to develop innovative products and services, or even train and test athletes within the mountain biking and cycling sector. It will also offer a place for businesses to showcase their products in the heart of the UKs leading mountain bike destination.

In addition, the renovation of the listed Caerlee Mill for commercial use will help preserve an important building for the local community and for Scotland's industrial heritage.

Mountain Biking Innovation & Technology Summit

In August 2023 South of Scotland Enterprise, Edinburgh Napier University, Developing Mountain Biking in Scotland, Scottish Borders Council, in partnership with Cycling Industries Europe staged a 2-day Power of the Bike Summit at MacDonald Cardrona Hotel and Glentress, the host venue for the Cross-Country Mountain Bike World Championships.

The Power of the Bike Innovation Summit welcomed over 200 delegates across the 2 days and included some of the biggest bike brands in the world to network and meet many South of Scotland businesses. It proved to be a great success, with a series of announcements on the day, including the new Bike Innovation Scotland brand revealed by Minister for Small Business, Innovation and Trade, Richard Lochhead who also launched Scotland's Mountain Bike Strategy 2023-2025 on the day.

CivTech 7.4: A New digital tool to help strengthen South's active travel network

An innovative new digital tool which will support South of Scotland communities to develop new active travel networks in their areas has been showcased for the first time.

The new product is being developed by Sweco as part of the CivTech Challenge project, which aims to use technology to solve real-life challenges facing public and third sector organisations in Scotland.

Sweco were set the challenge by South of Scotland Enterprise (SOSE) of using technology to unlock the power of the bike to stimulate demand for cycling infrastructure and support South of Scotland communities.

Europe's leading design, engineering, environment and regulatory consultants, Sweco have now created the Build Your Bike Route product, which aims to allows users to better understand active travel design.



INNOVATION & TECHNOLOGY

The product allows access to innovative digital mapping tools and alternative path construction techniques focussed on using low carbon and recycled materials.

This will aim to help communities and the public sector currently facing resource and skills issues to speed up their active travel strategies in rural areas.

This in turn will increase viable planning applications and approvals, and then investment in cycle path infrastructure, supporting local and national targets linked to a Just Transition to Net Zero.

BASE College









Scottish Borders College & Dirt School Collaboration

Run in conjunction with the world-famous Dirt School, the BASE Mountain Biking course is a performance-based, three-year full-time academic programme that allows the students to ride their bikes and work on their technique two days a week while attaining a recognised HN level qualification. It creates an inclusive environment that has allowed over 100 young people to learn important life skills.

In 2023/24 32 BASE Mountain Bike students have enjoyed studying SCQF Level 6 Achieving Excellence in Sport, SCQF Level 7 HNC IN Sports Coaching and Development & SCQF Level 8 HNC IN Sports Coaching and Development.

Over the years, the course has produced some of the finest talent in the world of mountain biking including World Champion, Reece Wilson and William Brodie who was crowned Junior British Downhill Champion at Glencoe within recent years.

Run and delivered by Dirt School in partnership with Borders College, BASE College course is a programme unlike anything else currently available. Students will progress both technical skills and racecraft, whilst broadening their knowledge of the sport with academic studies, culminating with a Higher National Diploma after graduating third year.

South of Scotland claims prestigious international UCI Bike Region Label.

The South is the first region in Scotland to be awarded the label by cycling's world governing body, the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI). The label recognises a city or region's commitment to both Elite cycling competition and cycling for all.

The label is held by just 26 cities and regions across the globe and acknowledges locations that not only host major UCI events, but also invest in developing community cycling and related infrastructure and programmes.

The award was presented to the South of Scotland Cycling Partnership whose submission to the UCI highlighted its ground-breaking ten-year strategy, which was launched last year.

This recognition from the UCI will raise the profile of the region to cyclists across the world, helping showcase our offering, attract more visitors and encourage locals to embrace the freedom of riding a bike. This in turn will support the South of Scotland's valuable tourism and events industry, creating jobs and sustaining communities.



Galashiels Hike & Bike Hub

The Hike and Bike Hub is a Social Enterprise, in the Scottish Borders who look to encourage people in and around Galashiels area to walk and cycle more through the promotion of active travel and healthy leisure activities.

The charity was established by Angela and George Crow, residents of Galashiels and keen walkers and cyclists, and identified the need for a walking and cycling hub in the town centre.

South of Scotland Enterprise have been supporting the team and outcomes include Hike and Bike securing premises in Galashiels, building their business plan and levering in over £20,000 in external funding for the delivery of their services.

A key organisational priority for the Hub moving forward is to be an autism positive employer and trainer, with inclusivity and support at the heart of any recruitment to encourage and retain neurodiverse staff members.





Newcastleton Bunkhouse

Newcastleton bunkhouse has been operating for it's first full calendar year in 2023. This is a community owned bunkhouse with outstanding facilities for welcoming touring road cyclists, off-road mountain bikers uses the near-by 7stanes trails or bikepacking gravel bikers passing through the region on an adventure from Keilder Forest.

Newcastleton Bunkhouse forms a small part of a more extensive and ambitious vision for the town. The next phase of Newcastleton's Holm Hill, the Active Leisure Strategy, gets underway with a £500k investment from partners; UK Gov's Shared Prosperity Fund £284k, South of Scotland Enterprise Ambitions Fund £100k, Scottish Government's Strengthening Communities Fund £40k and Newcastleton Community Trusts own funds which will all contribute to this initial first phase of the community Active Leisure Strategy.

This phase provides funding for old paths to be reopened and creation of new mountain bike trails to complement the existing 7Stanes mountain bike network at Newcastleton.

Wheels of Fleet

Wheels of Fleet is an example of just one of a range of ground breaking social enterprise orginisations that enrich the South of Scotland and are dedicated to helping to get more people more often onto bikes whilst benefiting the most in need within their communities.

This community bike project at Gatehouse has celebrated eight years in operation in 2023.

From small beginnings, Wheels of Fleet has become a major link in the chain of pedal power locally. The innovative up-cycling project reconditions donated bikes for hire with a bank of e-bikes also available for public use and a maintenance and servicing offer for cycling visitors.

The long-term development of accessible cycling experiences delivers against our strategic ambition to offer opportunities within our Sport, Recreation & Wellbeing theme.



Cycling Scotland

Cycling Scotland offers a programme of expert support, including funding from Transport Scotland, to help workplaces, schools, campuses, communities, and social housing providers across Scotland be cycling friendly and attain nationally accredited awards.

Cycling Scotland and South of Scotland business, colleges, employers and communities have celebrated the opportunity to secure funding support and investment in cycling infrastructure which supports our people to cycle more in their everyday lives.

Cycling UK

Cycling UK has supported over 2,500 participants in the South of Scotland across four projects. Through projects they've been able to offer a huge range of bike loans, trials and events to the South of Scotland area, paying particular attention to underrepresented groups. Over 1000 participants received discounted bike repairs funded by Cycling UK and completed by 26 partner repair organisations.

Successes have included events such as a cycling 'roadshow' in Sanquhar, 'Pop-Up' cycle repair shops in Selkirk, a Scotland Advisory Committee networking event in Dumfries and a Scottish Borders Active Travel Networking Event attended by Patrick Harvie MP.

Scottish Cycling Highlights

We are hugely grateful to Scottish Cycling, who have had a fantastic year delivering cycling activity in the South of Scotland. They have staged a plethora of amazing events across the region, including two prestigious National Championships in Cross Country Mountain Biking and Downhill Mountain Biking, and the inaugural edition of a national level road race.

Linked to the World Championships, there were also Ride The Worlds regional qualifiers in the region, grassroots racing for youngsters, with the best riders qualifying to compete during the major event itself. On top of this there were on site activations delivered so the public could give cycling a go during the Para Road Races held in the region. Ride the Worlds gave children and young people the opportunity to experience the thrill of racing both a competitive and non-competitive way. This project led by partner, Scottish Cycling, brought a strong connection with local community groups and cycling clubs to the event.

There has been significant investment in the development of the sport, with coaching qualifications being delivered across the region, almost 150 people going through the Rock Up & Ride programme, which gives free bikes to people who otherwise wouldn't be able to afford them, and £100,000 invested into the development of Walkerburn Pump Track thanks to the Cycling Facilities Fund, with future investment into other facilities currently in partnership development with Dalbeattie Rocks & Wheels.

Scottish Cycling, in partnership with both local councils, have committed funding and support for new cycling development officers for both the Scottish Borders and Dumfries & Galloway.

Dumfries & Galloway Highlights

£950,000 has been secured and invested from the Transport Scotland Cycling, Walking and Safe Routes budget. The focus of investments in 2023 have been decreasing traffic speed limits to 20mph, remove barriers and improving cycling infrastructure in and around primary and secondary schools. These investments directly facilitate walking, wheeling and scooting to school and form an important part of the behavioural change programme across the region.



Scottish Borders Highlights

In 2023 every primary six pupil across the Scottish Borders received Bikeability Scotland cycle safety training, and this is on track to be repeated this year.

They are just one of nine Scottish local authorities to have achieved a 100 per cent delivery rate.

The programme was delivered locally by the Outdoor Education team, with ongoing support from Cycling Scotland, Smarter Choices, Smarter Places funding and the Community Cycling Fund.

The playground based Bikeability 1 cycle skills training and Bikeability 2 road safety cycle training is delivered to all P6 classes across the region, normally over the course of three days in each primary school.

Over the last 12 months the team has worked with over 1,100 pupils to increase their cycling confidence, develop hazard perception and awareness, and promote active travel.
